



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NEW VIRTUAL ADULT EDUCATION CLASS

"ASK THE RABBI"

WITH RABBI EMERITUS DAVID WEISSMAN

In an effort to provide our congregants with some new programming in addition to our weekly Shabbat services, Rabbi David Weissman, Temple Shalom's Rabbi Emeritus, will be offering a once-a-month Adult Education class.

This class, entitled "ASK THE RABBI", will last about an hour beginning at 1:30 P.M. on Tuesday, November 10, 2020. There is no charge for the class and no prior registration is required.

The format of each class session will be as follows: Those attending, or some of those attending, will ask Rabbi David a question about any aspect of Judaism. Rabbi David will discuss the Jewish answer (and sometimes there will be several Jewish answers, some of which may contradict each other) and then open up the topic for additional questions and discussion. Everyone with an opinion on the matter will have an opportunity to speak. After the topic is exhausted, Rabbi David will ask for someone else to pose a question on a different topic of Jewish interest.

All congregants will automatically be invited to join our Zoom program. Any other family, friends, community guests, etc. who wish to participate in this program need to email us at **templeshalomtreasurer@gmail.com** to receive an invitation to join the class. If you know anyone who would be interested in this program, please let them know. A specific schedule has not been determined at this time. We will decide at each session which Tuesday the class will be held the following month and an email will be sent to everyone, in advance of the next class, inviting you to participate.

Inspirational Message

The Jewish New Year is a time of new beginnings and a period of reflection. This year, we are thinking about what this means for Temple Shalom. The last few months have been difficult for many members of our community, who are isolated from family and friends. We have been united by virtual prayer, but we miss being in our sanctuary, singing together, and seeing each other. There is a comfort when we all gather together to pray in person. This year, we hope to capture that feeling by seeing how many congregants will join us for our online services and programs, which are open to anyone. The transition to a virtual world has been a new beginning for all of us.


