## A Message from the President

Lexi, our Springer Spaniel, and I were out walking one Saturday afternoon. The sun was shining. There was a slight breeze blowing our hair. Leaves were rustling. Birds were singing and flying around us. G-d was around us. A perfect time for speaking to G-d. I thought: Why bother going to synagogue to pray when I can pray in nature or anywhere and anytime, I want? Why pay money to

belong to a synagogue?

During Book Club, we talked about how important it is to be a part of a Jewish community, especially when you are living in an area where you are the minority. Many of us grew up in Jewish neighborhoods. We were the majority not the minority. We didn't have to explain why we didn't go to school on Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur – our teachers and non-Jewish friends knew and understood. My friends, Jewish and non-Jewish, knew when it was a holiday for matzoh ball soup or latkes or chocolate wine sponge cake (and they invited themselves to join us because my mom was a wonderful cook). Outside of our Temple Shalom community, I have come in contact with very few people in this area who know about and understand our holidays and rituals.

Rituals have always been very important to me. Judaism is all about religious practices and rituals within a community of other Jews. Last year, my week revolved around joining Cookie, Michelle and Shelley for virtual services. Reciting the familiar prayers and reading our Temple family's greetings were the "normal" for my week. I can't thank them enough for giving me a sense of peace and belonging during COVID lockdown. Growing up, my family linked life cycle events with Jewish rituals: my grandmother's birthday was Pesach, my mom found out she was pregnant at Cousin Marty's Bar Mitzvah (it wasn't the chopped liver, it was morning sickness), my parents' anniversary was Lag B'omer.

I grew up as part of a synagogue. I attended religious school for 13 years and then taught there for 3 more years. When my parents had to work and couldn't drive us to our Temple, I walked to the Orthodox Shul, that was a few blocks away, on Saturday mornings. There have been periods of time, as an adult, when I didn't belong to a synagogue and/or attend services regularly. There was always something missing for me during those times—there was a feeling of being disconnected.

These days, I am feeling very connected and grateful for it. That is why I should attend and belong to Temple Shalom. Being connected to people who share Jewish religious and cultural experiences is important to me. Being part of a minyan so others can say Kaddish when they need to is important to me. As we have been saying in the announcements," it is necessary that whenever possible you attend services in person, so that we have a minyan. Without a minyan, certain parts of the service, including Kaddish, cannot traditionally be performed." I know that many of you feel as I do because we have had a minyan for all but one service in the last few months. You have told me that you came to services on a certain evening or morning to ensure that there was a minyan. Thank you to all of our Temple Shalom family for supporting this community through belonging, attending services, volunteering, and making donations.

Wishing you a Chanukah that is filled with happy memories of the past and with making new memories in the present. Hope Sachwald,

## SHALOM RAV – A PIECE OF PEACE FROM THE RABBI

Dear Temple Shalom family,

As you read this, we will be in the middle of celebrating our holiday of Chanukah. It lasts 8 days beginning on the 25th of Kislev each year, which can occur anytime between the end of November and the end of December in our Gregorian or American calendars. This year, it's on the earlier side, though next year, when the Jewish leap year effects kick in just before Purim, it will be on the later side.

According to Talmudic legend, the holiday lasts eight days because of the miracle of the oil in the Temple. What was this miracle? During the Hasmonean revolt against the Syrian-Greek empire for outlawing Jewish practices and defiling the Holy Temple in Jerusalem with pagan rituals (including pig slaughter) and decorations, the Syrian-Greeks also destroyed all of the pure olive oil that had the high priest's seal on it. Once the revolt, led by the Maccabean family and their followers, was successful, the Temple was cleansed and the seven-branched candelabra. called the *Menorah*, was repaired and rekindled with a small vial of sealed oil that was discovered during the repairs. A debate ensued as to whether the oil should be lit right away, running the risk of having it go out again before new oil could be purified, or wait a week until the new purified oil was almost ready, so that once rekindled, the *Menorah* (which was also the *Ner Tamid* – everlasting light) could burn continuously as prescribed by law. Those who said light it right away won, and the "miracle" was that it still lasted the full eight days until the new oil was ready.

The truth is that this is likely a myth. *Chanukah* is a post-biblical holiday. The only place to find sources about it are in the books of the Maccabees. Anyone who reads those books will find many shocking examples of violence between the Hasmonean rebels and their more assimilated

fellow Jews. This was certainly not a time of "light" for our people historically. The most likely explanation is that the majority of the Jews at the time had become so assimilated that they forgot (or chose not) to observe the holiday of *Sukkot*. As you know, *Sukkot* is also a weeklong holiday,

followed by *Shemini Atzeret*, the Eighth Day of Assembly. It was an extremely important holiday celebrating water, as well as other things, in a land that is mostly desert. Once the Temple was cleansed and rededicated, they likely decided it was better to observe *Sukkot & Shemini Atzeret* late rather than not at all.

Still, it's no coincidence that so many religious and cultural celebrations around this darkest time of the year, the winter solstice, share themes of light (Diwali, Kwanzaa, Christmas, and many more). One of the rules (*halachot*) of *Chanukah* is "*l'farsem et haness* – to publicize the miracle visibly". We do this by lighting our candles in a front window, showing our light and our story to others. We do this when we take our turn lighting the public *Chanukiyah* at the Market Commons Square.

Perhaps the best lesson we can take from *Chanukah* is the importance of standing up for our identity and against assimilation, but not at the expense of other peoples, cultures, and religions. It is only through this kind of unity and pluralism that we can fulfill the prophetic dream of *Chanukah*, "Not by might and not by power but by My spirit alone says *Yah*, our God."

Whatever holidays you observe and whenever you observe them, we hope you will join us at Temple Shalom in celebrating them together, helping to make our community a holy gathering place comfortable for all.
