A letter from the President

As many of you know, I have been taking virtual classes and workshops since the beginning of COVID. During January, all of my classes included a "word of the year." My word is "kindness." Mom used to tell me that it took a lot more energy to be mean and nasty than it did to be kind. This month marks two years since the passing of Mike's cousin, Max Lipman. His long-time friend

posted this on Facebook: "Max Lipman... died this week and his service was yesterday. Serving in Special Forces in Vietnam didn't kill him, being called a "baby-killer" when he came home didn't kill him, living with the effects of agent-orange and the emotional-aftermath of his time in Vietnam didn't kill him, diabetes didn't kill him and COPD didn't kill him. It took a liver that didn't work anymore and stage-four cancer to do that. Thank you for your: time, humor, friendship and love among other things. You made this world, my world and the worlds of many others a better place to be..."

Max had every reason not to be kind. Injuries and illness, a cheating business partner, a divorce, financial struggles, and difficult bosses could have resulted in a sullen, hateful person.

That wasn't Max. Max was short and stout; but it was his personality, not his girth that filled a room when he entered it. I first met Max at a rehearsal dinner the night before my cousin's wedding. I was helping serve the food (and not happy that my mom had volunteered me to do it). Max was a groomsman and needed to fit into his Tux the next day. Max would fill a plate, and his wife or my aunt would take it from him. He kept coming back for another plate. He had me laughing in no time and my bad mood disappeared.

I met Mike at the wedding the next day. Having Max as a cousin was always a bonus to marrying Mike. Max was an amazing story teller. He was also a risk taker, so he ended up in many precarious situations. The last time we were together he had us crying-laughing in the middle of a restaurant as he described the crew trying to get him back into the boat after parasailing. He probably weighed 320 pounds at the time. According to Max, after many futile attempts, he swam back to shore with the boat following at a distance so as not to create a wake.

Max always made time for the people in his life. Although he worked the night shift, he drove from Pennsylvania to Baltimore to spend most of the day with us after my mom passed away. Then, he drove back to Pennsylvania to go to work.

Max was a great friend. After Mike's heart attack, he understood about my anxiety. He called and texted to check on us on a more regular basis. As usual, he kept us laughing. Before he passed away, he called, from the hospital, to say good-bye and apologize for missing the annual May visit.

When I am having a day when someone is giving me a hard time, I look at one of my favorite pictures –Mike and Max trying on loud Hawaiian shirts in Margaritaville's gift shop – and I remember to laugh and be kind.

The first month of 2022 has not been kind between COVID and bad weather. Wishing you a kinder rest of the year.

SHALOM RAV – A PIECE OF PEACE FROM THE RABBI

Dear Temple Shalom family,

Kol hatchalot kashot – the Sages have a saying that "all beginnings are hard". Perhaps our beginning was harder than most. I began speaking with the then co-Presidents, Cookie and Laurie, months before the Covid pandemic began in March of 2020. We had some lovely conversations, and even one zoom interview with the search committee. But then we agreed that we should wait as the shutdown changed everything. We kept in touch over the first year of the pandemic, and then things began to appear to be subsiding. Finally, in April of 2021, we both agreed to an experiment in having me commute into the community to lead services on a monthly basis, and for all of the fall holidays. A few other activities were included such as online classes and meetings. I was excited to join the annual meeting last June, and then start the monthly visits in July and August. The fall holiday visits for Rosh Hashanah, Yom Kippur, Sukkot, and Simchat Torah all seemed to go very well (even if the weather for Sukkot was challenging). Though the pandemic occasionally waned, it began going through waves of mutations and new spikes. All of that made travel extremely challenging. Just last month we saw record numbers of infections and hospitalizations so I didn't feel it was safe for me, or for the congregation, for my scheduled January visit to occur. I very much appreciate the support for that decision. As you know by now, I made the decision last month to tender the termination clause that each of us had in our agreement. Quite simply, the experiment wasn't working for me. I do believe that things would likely have been different without the pandemic, but that is something none of us controls. Though it's been a brief tenure, I've enjoyed all that we've done together. Temple Shalom should be very proud, not only of the talented and wonderful volunteers who capably keep the weekly services going when rabbis aren't there (not to mention all the other programs), but of the community you have built together in Myrtle Beach. I experienced more joy and singing during the Temple's services than I have at many

congregations that are 3 or 4 times larger. I'm grateful for the opportunity to have joined you, if only briefly, and for all of the kindness and hospitality shown me these past 8 months.

A last sermonic thought that I want to leave you with is this: One would think that the Torah, the Five Books of Moses, with its covenant and promise of a homeland, would end with a Hollywood-style grand entrance into the Land of Canaan, and our beginning to build a Land of Israel (of "God-wrestlers"). But it doesn't! It ends with perhaps the greatest leader ever dying and being buried in an undisclosed place on the east side of the Jordan River. And we, the people of Israel, are encamped on that eastern shore, waiting to enter the Promised Land. Why does it end this way? I believe the lesson is to teach us that life is not about achieving the goal, but rather about the journey we go through in living it. How we behave, and what we learn during that journey, is what's important.

As we come to our official end, I want to remind you that in Hebrew, we don't say goodbye; we say "lehitra'ot" – until we see each other again. While none of us knows when that might be, please know that you are each now in my "network." One never knows where life's journeys may take us. As we also have a Jewish value of hachanassat orchim – welcoming guests – know that my home will always be open to you, especially knowing how many of you have connections in, or pass through, the mid-Atlantic. And as I leave, I want to bestow upon you the three-fold blessing of our people:

May God bless you and guard you May God's light shine upon you and bring you grace May God's presence lift you up and bring you peace. Shalom ulehitra'ot – peace and until we see each other again,

What's Happening at Temple Shalom - January 2022

Temple Shalom's Board of Directors met on Sunday, January 16, 2022. Following the open meeting, there was an executive session to discuss personnel issues.

Bad news first:

On 01/14/2022, Rabbi Gordy requested that the contract between him and Temple Shalom be terminated. His contract provided for termination by either party with 30 days' notice. We entered into this contract knowing that having a "commuter" rabbi was an experiment. With COVID, commuting has been a problem (flight delays, close proximity to people in airports and on planes). The congregation getting to interact with Rabbi Gordy and Rabbi Gordy getting to know the congregation has also been difficult. Because of COVID, our opportunities for social gatherings have been limited. We did not have the opportunity to share Shabbat dinners or brunches or even our normal Onegs together. Rabbi Gordy offered to give more than the 30 days' notice required in the contract.

Temple Shalom's Board of Directors has voted to accept Rabbi Gordy's resignation, as of 01/14/2022. Although he was willing to wait to terminate until March 31, 2022, there was no way we could predict if travel would be any safer in February or March than it was in January. Rabbi Gordy will complete the learning sessions for January 25 and February 1, 2022. His last day as Temple Shalom's Rabbi will be 02/13/2022. Temple Shalom thanks him all for of his hard work: officiating at services (and even a wedding), the sermons that made us think, researching alternative high holiday prayer books that have more transliteration, the singing, the dancing and the teaching. We wish him the best in whatever he chooses to do next.

Good News:

At the request of the Board, Michelle Foels has completed our application to join URJ (Union for Reform Judaism). If our application is accepted, there are many benefits to joining, including the ability to hire a cantor or student rabbi for the holidays; workshops; conferences; social media apps, which would incorporate other small congregations; and the ability to purchase items at discount for the Temple. There is a fee structure designed specifically for small congregations. We can hire any Rabbi of our choosing as long as the Rabbi not have any ethical or moral issues.

More Good News:

Rabbi David and Mary Weissman are moving back to Myrtle Beach. As of January 23, 2022, Temple Shalom has a signed contract with Rabbi David to be our part-time Rabbi. He will be leading services for holidays and two Friday and two Saturday services a month. For members of Temple Shalom, he will also be available to officiate at life-cycle events, provide personal pastoral counseling, and communicate with those who are ill. Rabbi David's contract begins on July 1, 2022. We look forward to welcoming both Rabbi David and Mary back to Temple Shalom!

Current News:

We have had/have congregants leading services with Mike for all of January. The next opportunities to lead a Friday evening service are on February 4th and February 11th.

Health and Safety Plan – Temple Shalom's decision making with respect to health and safety practices is guided by Jewish values, which include: "Safeguarding Life, "Avoiding Endangering Life" and "We Are Responsible for One Another."

In response to COVID, our goal is to be able to continue in-person services. In-person game days have been temporarily suspended. A virtual Bingo game time is being planned. Virtual trivia is also a possibility.

Temple Shalom has formed a Crisis Preparedness Committee. Cookie and Gabe Brenner are chairing the committee. During the first meeting, members were assigned the task of contacting law enforcement agencies that support our area as well as neighboring houses of worship. The Secure Community Network has virtual trainings available on their website (securecommunitynetwork.org). The next committee meeting is on Sunday, February 6 at 10 A.M.

Annual Meeting (and pizza dinner)- Wednesday, June 15 at 6 P.M.

High Holy Days – Thanks to Marian Rosen and Central Synagogue in St. Louis, for sharing the Machzor for Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur that they have created over 30 years. Using their Machzor, as a starting point, Temple Shalom is working on creating our own prayer books for Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur with transliterations on the same or an adjacent page to the prayer in Hebrew.
