RABBI DAVID A. LYON writes, "The Book of Leviticus is not a favorite among biblical readers. If it'sany indication, Hollywood hasn't recreated any scenes from Leviticus, like it has from Genesis and Exodus. But for all its talk about sacrifices and bodily effects, Leviticus has a lot to tell us if we lift the ancient rituals out of their ancient settings and dust them off for relevant lessons."

During April, while plodding through the chapters of Leviticus and commentaries on those chapters to write sermons for Shabbat services, I found myself agreeing with Rabbi Lyon.

Hanna Perlberger, an author, attorney, spiritual teacher and coach, addresses the Torah portion, Metzora in an article excerpted from A Year of Sacred Moments: The Soul Seeker's Guide to Inspired Living: "A metzora is a person afflicted with the mystical spotted disease who was sent out of the camp until healed. Often, though not exclusively, the cause of this affliction was because the person had gossiped against others. While being isolated from the rest of the camp can seem like a steep punishment for a wagging tongue, the Torah wants us to understand how gossip and slander can tear apart the fabric of a society. Negative speech originates in the thought process of judging someone negatively, constructing a "reality" around that judgment and then attempting to rope others into endorsing the construct, and so on. Gossip is a virulent social virus, and so the cure has to be targeted to fight the disease at its deepest level."

This passage reminds me of a situation that occurred at a middle school when I was still a very young speech/language pathologist. I was only assigned to the school one day a week. As a special educator in those days, you were fairly invisible and other teachers would talk as if you were not there. On this particular day, I pretended that I wasn't there as gossip flew around the building destroying "the fabric of society" and community in this school. A couple, who were allowed to work at the same school, were involved in divorce proceedings after he had an affair with another teacher at school. The other teachers took sides **and the gossip and animosity grew**. On that day while they not only gossiped about the love triangle, but also about each other's work and responsibilities at school, they didn't realize that they could hear each other through the vents in the break rooms. For the rest of the day the principal was bombarded with complaints, both from his staff and from the folks at the district office, who knew people at the school. **And the gossip exploded!** When I returned to the school the next week, all three of the teachers in the love triangle had been exiled to other schools. With more than half of the school year gone, this was a major disruption for the students. The remaining staff lost planning time to participate in mandatory team building exercises.

Hannah Perlberger writes, "Each component of a complicated ritual that takes place over days was intended to take the metzora through the process of feeling the pain of disconnection, and then rebuilding mind, body and soul in order to reconnect. It's not punishment, but rather rehabilitation—true rehabilitation as it is meant to be."

By the beginning of the next year, the school had mostly different staff and a different principal. I don't think many of the people in my story reconnected with each other. I also don't know if they learned a lesson and were rehabilitated, but I definitely learned a lesson. Over the next 40+ years, I never said anything in a school (or in an email) that I didn't want the entire community to hear. If you are on the Board or have attended a Board meeting, it is also why I begin every meeting with "remember to use active listening and be kind." Here is Perlberger's advice for not becoming a metzora:

- "Don't turn complaints into criticism. Criticism is a global personal attack, whereas a complaint is about a specific behavior. "I'm upset that you came home late without letting me know because now our dinner is cold" is a complaint. "I can't believe how inconsiderate and selfish you are not to call me" is a criticism. If you've been critical, apologize and separate the criticism out of the complaint, and stick to the facts."
- "Don't be so attached to your position that there is no space for another point of view. If you are fighting to be "right," someone else has to be "wrong," and when this happens in your relationship, it's the relationship that loses. There is no true victory when you fight with your partner about who is right. Most arguments are not between right and wrong anyway, but between a 'right' and another 'right'."
- "Change your perception, change your story, change your life: We are all meaning-makers par excellence, but what we don't realize is that we have a lot of choice about it. We make up stories in our head, but then we have to live in the stories we create, and often those stories, which we confuse with "the facts," get in the way of a relationship. When you are upset with someone's behavior, ask yourself if there is any other possible explanation or motive other than the negative one you have attributed to that person."
- "Appreciate the good: We always find what we're looking for. Make it a practice to focus on what is working, what a person is doing right, and what there is to be grateful for. You can repair arguments when you realize that your focus was narrow, and that you excluded the reality of the bigger picture."
- "Understand that words create reality: We think we have the right to say whatever we want as long as it's "true." Before shooting that zinger, ask yourself, "Is it necessary? Is it kind? What result am I hoping to accomplish by saying it?" Being kind is more important than being right. Many times, what people need is not a brilliant mind that speaks, but a special heart that listens. So if you have something that should not have been said, apologize. Own it. Admit that you were wrong. After all, love does mean having to say you're sorry."

He is working on bids for the kitchen window, the back door, the gate to the back lot, and security for events. Mike is researching mission statements that we can use as a model. Hope is checking out self-defense programs. If you can add to our list of needs, specific to preventing a possible terrorism event; or if you can help with any of the tasks, please contact Cookie Brenner. On Sunday, April 10, Cpl. Tomlin, Horry County Police Department, presented an Active Shooter workshop. Thank you to all of the Temple members who attended this safety presentation, in-person or on Zoom. Cpl. Tomlin will continue to work with the committee and the Board to assist with the grant (needs assessment) and on other suggestions for our safety.
