#### A Letter from the President August 2022

On August 21, 2022, Temple Shalom will have a service to join a Torah, gifted to us from Temple B'nai Sholom, to our congregation. Following the service,

there will be a reception to celebrate this blessed event.

B'nai Sholom in Quincy, Illinois was among the oldest synagogues in America. The Jewish community in Quincy began to develop in the mid-1850s, part of a pilgrimage of Jews beyond the eastern seaboard cities. Transplants were seeking opportunity in one of many bustling port towns along the Mississippi River, which were rich with natural resources like timber.

It is reported that the first Jew to settle in Quincy was Abraham Jonas, an original founder of the congregation and a friend of, and attorney to, Abraham Lincoln. By 1852, the congregation had a minyan and decided to raise funds to build a Temple.

When the building, designed to reflect the Oriental roots of Judaism, was completed, the congregants danced the Torahs from the town center to the Temple's present location with many members of the clergy from Quincy participating. Rabbi Isaac Mayer Wise, the founder of American Reform Judaism, was the featured speaker when the cornerstone was laid in July,1869. When B'nai Sholom was dedicated in 1870, there were over 651 congregants and they employed a full-time rabbi. Although B'nai Sholom followed Reform rites, because of its size and being the only Jewish house of worship, the congregation adopted an unwritten policy of tolerance of practice among its members.

By the mid-1870s, Jewish life in Quincy was beginning to decline. Economic opportunities and opportunities to find a Jewish spouse caused people to move from Quincy. Around 1906, some Jewish refugees from Eastern Europe and Russia began arriving in Quincy; however, they were Orthodox and did not want to join a Reform congregation.

From 1917 until 1935, B'nai Shalom had no permanent Rabbi, probably due to budgetary constraints and that Rabbis no longer saw B'nai Sholom as an attractive pulpit. With the arrival of

Jews constitute about 2 percent of the population of the United States, but they have contributed well beyond their percentage of the population in such fields as science, medicine, law, banking, finance, politics, literature, and publishing. Jews excel, contributing to these fields far more than their proportion of the population.

But there is one area where Jews don't excel.

Judaism is the mother religion of both Christianity and Islam. Jesus was born a Jew and died a Jew. The Jewish Bible, what Christians call the Old Testament but which Jews just call the Bible, is revered by both Christians and Muslims.

The Jewish community in the United States has long been exceptional in many ways. But while Jews are more socio-politically active and have more formal education than the national norm, the Jews, at the same time, are the most religiously-disconnected mainstream faith in the nation. In a recent American National Life Survey, only 4 percent of those who identified themselves as Jews report that they usually attend religious services once a week or more.

In other words, only one out of every 25 Jews in the United States attends weekly Shabbat services on a regular basis. Attendance at religious services is a way of thanking the Creator, the Rock, the Source of All Being that is beyond our comprehension and that we call God, for giving us the gift of life and for bestowing so many blessings on each of us.

However, while Jews heavily embrace cultural traditions such as food and festivals, their participation in conventional forms of religious practice, like attendance at religious services, is much lower than the national norm.

Religious services are the backbone of every synagogue and yet the majority of Jews don't belong to a synagogue and, outside the Orthodox community, the majority of Jews who belong to a synagogue don't attend religious services on a weekly basis.

Jews have worked very hard to build and maintain temples – houses of worship – to foster their religion. And Temple Shalom owes a debt of gratitude to those who give so much of their time in support of Temple Shalom. But many of us work hard for Temple Shalom so <u>OTHERS</u> can attend weekly services on a regular basis. We only attend services occasionally or just on the High Holidays, leaving it to others to attend on a regular basis. We're willing to work for the temple, but we're not willing to attend services on a regular basis to thank God for the blessing of life. Some of us put a loved one's name on the *Mi Shebeirach* list or the name of a departed loved one on the *Yahrzeit* list, but will rarely attend services when the name is read.

THE GREATEST DANGER TO JUDAISM TODAY IS NOT ANTI-SEMITISM FROM OUTSIDE THE JEWISH COMMUNITY, BUT INDIFFERENCE FROM WITHIN. I WANT TO THANK AND CONGRATULATE THOSE MEMBERS OF TEMPLE SHALOM WHO ATTEND WEEKLY SHABBAT SERVICES ON A REGULAR BASIS EITHER IN PERSON OR VIA ZOOM. But so many of us are unwilling to gather on a regular basis in a spirit of fellowship for an hour or so to thank God for this gift of life. And if we're unable to physically attend services, we are even unwilling to participate from the comfort of our homes via Zoom for just about an hour a week.

Don't we all have an obligation to show our gratitude to God for this wonderful gift of life by attending weekly services?

The tradition teaches that there are three pillars on which Judaism rests: good works, study and prayer.

Someone can't be a good Jew unless he/she is a kind, compassionate person who treats other human beings with respect, dignity and concern. But doing good works isn't enough. Prayer plays a vital role in Judaism. If we are given a gift, the polite thing to do is say "thank you." The most valuable gift each of us has been given is the gift of life. We're not entitled to have a life, a consciousness, a sense of self-awareness. Life is a gift from God. We don't understand God. God is beyond human comprehension. God can be viewed as a Being or as the Creative Force in the universe or as just the Unknown. But whatever God's essence, God gave each of us the gift of life. We're not just here. The Source of Being brought us into existence. And attending religious services is the Jewish way of saying "thank you."

The Hebrew word "shuva" is often translated into English as "repentance," but the literal meaning of "shuva" is "return." And the tradition teaches that it is never too late to return. It's never too late to return to thanking God for the gift of life by attending weekly Shabbat services. It's never too late to show gratitude for being alive by attending Shabbat services on a regular basis.

"Who are we that you are mindful of us?" We read these words in Gates of Prayer. Now we must really think about them. This will be our third High Holiday together as a congregation. We have asked and prayed for many things. We might ask, do prayers get answered?

I think they do, but not always the way we think they will. If we believe in the power of prayer as well as being willing to work toward the things we ask for, we are not allowed to just sit back and think it will come to pass.

Our wish for a Torah has been in the forefront of our minds. What is a Jewish Congregation without the Sacred Scrolls? We were blessed on August 11, 2007, two years and two months after we started Temple

Shalom, to receive the gift of a Torah from Congregation B'nai Israel in Columbus, Mississippi. From Mississippi to Myrtle Beach, South Carolina — do prayers get answered? Do miracles happen? Yes!! We have spoken to everyone we know around the country, as well as Rabbis, friends and family in Israel. Psalm 121 asks, "From whence will my help come?" Sometimes from the most unexpected places. In May of this year I was in New York at a board meeting for Women of Reform Judaism. I spoke about our need for a Torah. Bonnie Oppenheimer heard my plea and asked if we would accept a Torah that needed some restoration. Ze'ev & I felt it would be a privilege if our congregation in time would be able to bring back to life a Torah that was brought to America in 1880 by their first Rabbi. The gift of a Torah arrived in time for our Havdalah service, which was followed by a wedding ceremony and dedication making this Torah truly ours. We now feel we are almost complete as a congregation. It is now time to work toward and pray for a building of our own. Maybe with our prayers and Adonai's help, in the right time this will come to pass. It is said G-D helps those that help themselves. We wish each of you L'Shanah Tovah Tikateivu (May you be inscribed for a good year)

German Jews escaping from Nazi rule, the congregation saw an increase in numbers. From 1956-1967, there was once again a full time Rabbi; although, in 1964, there were only 46 families included on the Temple's financial ledger.

Until 2015, Temple B'nai Sholom had managed to stay viable. New people would move to town and increase the membership so the congregation could manage the building. By 2015, the congregation of 24 members began planning to desanctify the temple and sell it, a difficult decision as there are no other synagogues in the Quincy area. On May 18, 2019, with only 15 regular family and individual members, after over 130 years, B'nai Sholom, the oldest Temple in the State of Illinois in continual existence, was deconsecrated and closed. At the end of the deconsecration service, worshippers sang and passed the temple's four Torah scrolls from hand to hand. Family members were asked to take the memorial plaques of their loved ones. The remaining items will be buried according to Jewish custom and tradition.

Through the Jewish Community Legacy Project (<a href="https://jclproject.org">https://jclproject.org</a>), the officers of B'nai Sholom established endowments to the Jewish Federation of St. Louis, the Illinois Holocaust Museum and Education Center, and the Community Foundation as well as one-time donations to many civic and charitable organizations. Two of the Temple's Torahs were given to towns in Germany and South America. After a diligent search, the remaining twoTorahs were given to the Tidewater Chavurah in Virginia Beach, VA and to Temple Shalom in Myrtle Beach, SC.

Temple Shalom would like to thank Michael Bukstein (President) and the members of the executive committee of B'nai Sholom for considering us a deserving congregation and gifting us with one of their sacred Torahs.
