We made it through the fall and winter and back to spring -- warm weather, flowers blooming, longer daylight hours and Pesach! At Pesach, we switch to "Morid hatal...You rain dew upon us" during the G'vurot at services. Not only is it shorter and easier to say than "Mashiv haruach umorid hagashem...You cause the wind to shift and the rain to fall", but it signifies the change from

winter to summer.

Why bother with the ritual of Pesach? It is hard work to celebrate this holiday. As Jews, we are commanded: "In every generation we must see ourselves as if we personally came out of Egypt." Celebrating Pesach means setting aside the time for the ritual of the Seder service. It means shopping for, preparing and eating only food that is Kosher for Passover. So why do we gather together every year with family and friends to celebrate Pesach – "because we were slaves but now we are a free people." For me, Pesach, more than any other holiday, links us to the greater Jewish community both in the time of the Exodus, the time in between, and in the present day. We can walk into any synagogue and join any Seder and we belong, we represent those who came before us and those who have yet to be born.

Pesach is an expensive holiday to celebrate. We did not have an abundance of money when I was growing up and buying Kosher for Passover food put a real strain on our family's budget. Part of the obligation and tradition of Pesach, in many families, is to make sure that everyone has a place to go to for Seder, a place to belong. Over the years, as a family, we have welcomed extended family, friends, and sometimes even strangers to join our Seders. I was telling my sister that not only would we not have Dad as a physical presence at Seder this year, but, for the first time ever, I would be the oldest person at the Seder table. She assured me that that would not be true as my brother-in-law invited an 80 year old with no place to go to join us. Belonging...

At the conclusion of Pesach, there is another obligation, that of the Yizkor service. This part of Pesach costs no money. All you have to do is give up a couple of hours of your time to support your Temple family. During the service, we think about our parents, relatives and friends who are with us only in our hearts and minds. We remember them and we honor their memories. This year, our Pesach Yizkor service takes place on Wednesday, April 12 at 10:30 A.M. A minyan is required to have a Yizkor service. Please support your Temple Shalom family by attending this service. This is one of those important times to show that you belong. Wishing you a happy and healthy Passover,

Those of us who grew up in Orthodox Jewish homes probably found the special dietary restrictions for Passover to be tedious and confusing. However, from a Reform perspective, the restrictions are quite easy to understand.

The Talmud states that the dietary restrictions with regard to leavening apply to five grains: WHEAT, RYE, BARLEY, OATS AND SPELT. These grains may NOT be eaten if leavening has occurred in the baking process. Leavening begins if the baking process lasts for 18 minutes or longer. So, to be kosher for Passover, any products made with these grains must be baked for less than 18 minutes. If leavening has NOT occurred in the baking process, these grains may be eaten. If you are buying a product containing one of these grains, the only way you can know that leavening has NOT occurred is if the package is marked KOSHER FOR PASSOVER or FOR PASSOVER USE.

Some local food stores have Passover sections, but occasionally a store will include a product marked KOSHER (but not Kosher for Passover) in its Passover section. As an example, a package of honey cake or macaroons may be marked KOSHER, but if it is not marked KOSHER for PASSOVER, the grain in its ingredients probably has been leavened and it is not suitable to be eaten during Passover.

The Reform movement adheres to the above Passover dietary restrictions.

However, there is a split in the various denominations when it comes to dishes, pots and pans and

silverware. The traditional practice is to use different dishes, pots and pans and silverware during Passover, a practice which most Reform Jews don't observe.

There are also different practices regarding foods called kitniyot (rice, corn, millet, legumes, dried beans, lentils, peas, green beans, soy beans, peanuts, sesame seeds, corn syrup and mustard).

Because kitniyot can often be confused with the five grains (wheat, rye, barley, oats and spelt), about 800 years ago, rabbinic authorities governing the practices of Ashkenazi Jews, who are those Jews of East European descent, ruled that kitniyot are prohibited during Passover. But they made the prohibition against kitniyot even more stringent than the prohibition against any LEAVENED products made with the above listed five grains. They prohibited ALL kitniyot during Passover. This prohibition was never adopted by Sephardi Jews, who originally hail from Spain, Portugal, North Africa and the Middle East. And it was not adopted by the Reform movement. In fact, the Responsa Committee of the Central Conference of American Rabbis (CCAR) issued an opinion that kitniyot may be eaten during Passover.

Orthodox Judaism still follows this practice for Ashkenazi Jews and the Conservative movement followed it up until November, 2016, when the Rabbinical Assembly, the governing body for the Conservative movement, ruled that kitniyot can be eaten during Passover. The Conservative rabbis felt that the prohibition no longer made sense. Now, there is no confusion about which foods are which, since they are all clearly labeled in supermarkets. However, many people are reluctant to abandon long held practices, so I am sure that many Jews outside of the Orthodox movement still will not eat kitniyot during Passover. I ,personally, do not find any current validity in observing a prohibition against eating kitniyot during Passover.

Wednesday Apr 5, 2023 1:00pm This Was Not America: A Wrangle Through Jewish-Polish-American History is a new book featuring a conversation, often contentious, between Michael Steinlauf, historian of Polish-Jewish culture and child of Holocaust survivors, and the anthropologist and artist Elżbieta Janicka. The conversation touches on critical moments in Jewish, Polish, and American history, including fleeing the Warsaw Ghetto, living underground fighting for social justice in 1960s' Seattle, and helping dismantle the communist system in 1980s' Poland. Beyond individual biography, the talk ranges from the apparition of a dybbuk in postwar Brooklyn to the consequences of a non-critical approach to Polish-Jewish studies. Join YIVO for a discussion of this unique new book with co-authors Steinlauf and Janicka led by Eddy Portnoy.
