A Letter from the President May 2023

I have been attending a URJ series entitled, "New Ideas Around Engagement." Rachel Margolis, an Associate Director of Congregational Innovation and Education at the Union for Reform Judaism (URJ), has been moderating the series. This is her introduction to the series on the URJ website: "You often see a congregation describe itself as "a warm and welcoming community." However, "warm and welcoming" is a catch-all that means little if we are welcoming people to a table that is already set. A warm and welcoming community says, "please join us for our meal at our table that we set without you. You are welcome here, but the work has already been done." Vibrant, thriving communities are those that are working to move past "warm and welcoming" towards "belonging." Leaders in a community of belonging say, "we want to know you!" - and make time to meet one-on-one with people outside of the synagogue walls. Leaders in a community of belonging take the time to learn names, find out what drives people, and say, "I'm so glad you are here! Let's work to set the table together so that we can enjoy a meal together."

Since reopening after COVID, Temple Shalom's Board of Directors has been working to increase engagement through a variety of services and activities, virtually and in-person. We have been reaching out through emails to both members and non-members. My vision for Temple Shalom is to be the religious version of "Cheers" – where everybody knows, not just your name, but who you are as an individual. I want to be that congregation where we can always put out an extra chair to make room for one more.

(I remember my mom and cousin rushing to add place settings and stretch the food when unexpected guests showed up for a family event. People were always more important than place settings or food.)

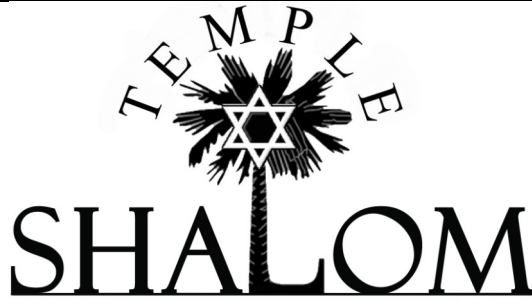
Unfortunately, another topic during our discussion about engagement during the URJ seminars has been safety. All of the speakers and participants have acknowledged that having locked doors, checking for ID, having security guards, and asking for proof of COVID vaccination is a huge departure from the synagogues of the past. All have also acknowledged that we need to live with the "new normal" while exploring innovative ways to increase engagement.

In a recent D'var Torah, I spoke about "how am I more than my name?" In my art classes, we are always being asked to describe ourselves so that we can create from our inner self. During URJ webinars, we are asked to define ourselves by the pronouns that we use. During this D'var Torah, I defined myself to those present: "My mother would say to me on a fairly regular basis that "nobody likes a smart ass." I am still her smart ass as well as still very spoiled (thanks to my husband taking over from my parents) and a stubborn Taurus. More than one of my students has referred to me as a witch or that word that rhymes with it – and yes, I can be both. Until October 2022, I was a daughter – now I am an orphan. I am still a sister, aunt, great aunt, cousin, and friend. I am a retired Speech/Language Therapist, but also remain a teacher. I am a life-long learner. I am a doggy mama and servant. I am something that I said I would never be – I am a wifey and I have a cup to prove it. I am a worrier but also "Pollyanna" – looking on the bright side. I am a maker although more creative than talented. I am an introvert who works hard to function as an extrovert. I am a president – a leader, receptionist, greeter, cleaning person, caterer, organizer, scheduler, compromiser, volunteer, writer and speaker. 

Sample learning opportunities:

Tuesday May 9, 2023 1:00pm BARUCH VLADECK AND THE MOVEMENT FOR PUBLIC HOUSING: Baruch Vladeck (1886-1938) was an important figure in American Yiddish culture, serving as the longtime managing editor of the Forverts, a New York City Councilman, president of the American ORT and chairman of the Jewish Labor Committee. Yet one of Vladeck's most significant, but still underappreciated, roles was his place on the first board of the New York City Housing Authority and as a supporter of public housing. The public housing movement in New York in part grew out of earlier Jewish tenant activism, especially on the Lower East Side. In the 1930s, New York City was a pioneer in the field of public housing, creating a system that today is the largest in the nation and houses around 340,000 people in its developments. In this talk, Michael Casper will explore Vladeck's unique place as a pioneer in the public housing movement.

Monday June 5, 2023 1:00pm YIDDISH TO THE CORE: WEDDING MUSIC AND JEWISH IDENTITY IN POSTWAR NEW YORK CITY: If you attended a typical American Jewish wedding in the 1950s, you might have noticed some departures from tradition, such as a photographer buzzing around the rabbi, a floral wedding canopy, or “kosher style” catering. The modern formula varied from one wedding to another, but one thing was certain: if it was a Jewish wedding, you danced a hora. Even as Jews became increasingly Americanized and abandoned older practices, they held on to Jewish dances and dance music as an easy and accessible way of articulating their Jewish identity at a public event, in front of their family and friends. Jewish music and dance underwent significant changes during the postwar period, absorbing strong influences from American popular music and Israeli folk songs. Nonetheless, dances like the hora, freylekh, and sher remained “Yiddish to the core.” For many American Jews, these dances became a symbol of cultural continuity, and one of the important elements that defined their wedding as Jewish. In this talk, Uri Schreter will explore the evolution of Jewish wedding music in the early postwar period across different sectors of New York’s Jewish community. We will discuss the relationship between diverse musical genres such as klezmer, Israeli folk song, swing, and Latin music, and learn how the choice of musical repertoire intersected with factors such as social class, religiosity, and political affiliation.
